I am honored to share the Residential Youth Services & Empowerment (RYSE) annual report, showcasing a year of significant growth and impact in our mission to support and empower the youth in our community. Throughout 2023, RYSE has made substantial strides in expanding our housing inventory, investing in our dedicated and growing team, and striving to meet the increasing demand for behavioral health support.



**Expansion of Housing Inventory:** In the past year, we achieved significant progress in expanding our housing inventory to provide safe and supportive environments for vulnerable youth. The openings of 'Apapane added an additional 6 bedrooms to accommodate homeless youth in our communities. Funded by a State Grant in Aid, 'Apapane serves as a transitional housing program tailored for individuals recovering from substance use disorders. With the recent land acquisition in Waianae, we are positioned to extend our reach and impact further in these areas.

**Growth and Investment in Staff:** At RYSE, we value our staff as the backbone of our organization, pivotal in providing top-tier care to the youth we serve. We prioritize their growth and investment through initiatives like professional development and ongoing training. In 2023, our staff increased by over 57%, bolstering our capacity to deliver exceptional care. Insights from our employee survey drive targeted efforts to boost workplace satisfaction and cultivate a culture of collaboration and excellence.

Strides to Meeting the Growing Need for Behavioral Health Support: Amidst the growing demand for behavioral health support among youth, RYSE remains committed to action. We've expanded mental health services and staff, and have implemented evidence-based practices to ensure comprehensive care for every young person in our hands. Our focus includes early intervention, trauma-informed care, and holistic approaches to nurture emotional well-being and resilience.

As we reflect on the past year and the accomplishments outlined in this report, we are continuously inspired by the progress we have made in our first 5 years. We remain dedicated to our mission of empowering youth and strengthening our communities.

# HELPING HANDS

### Youth Outreach

The RYSE Street Outreach team conducts hundreds of days of community engagement annually, ensuring support reaches our youth in need. With our 24/7 mobile crisis outreach line, we provide immediate assistance during housing emergencies, meeting youth wherever they are.

Bi-monthly pop-up events offer essential services and supplies across the island, bolstered by collaborations with community organizations. The Mobile Crisis Outreach van goes beyond refreshments, providing vital items like hygiene products, first-aid kits, and clothing, fostering trust with youth.

# **EMPOWERING FUTURES**

### **Education & Employment**

RYSE offers diverse programs to support youth transitioning into adulthood, led by our experienced Education & Employment team. Individualized counseling sessions are tailored to each of our client's needs. Educational initiatives encompass onsite GED training, high school reenrollment assistance, driver's license support, college application guidance,

peer outreach, and financial literacy education. Our group therapy sessions cover smart recovery, art therapy, improvisation, poetry, meditation, yoga, and anger management. For employment, we provide paid internships and vocational training in construction, nursing, sustainable farming, and social services.



Celebrating our 2023 Nurse Aide Program graduates. The program is a partnership with Hawaii Pacific Health and Lili`uokalani Trust, and provides 16-26 year olds with classroom learning and clinical lab training that sets youth up with the skills they need to enter the healthcare field.

# REDEFINING PATHS

### Diversion

Our Diversion Program is dedicated to steering youth away from homelessness, incarceration, and repeat offenses by providing comprehensive support. Through partnerships with community groups, the Hawaii State Judiciary, and law enforcement, we conduct in-reach initiatives to jails, prisons, and mental health facilities. We offer transportation assistance, advocate

during court hearings, facilitate probation, and provide access to legal counsel as needed. The RYSE Diversion team is continuously growing, making a deeper impact within the community. As we welcomed 43 new clients in 2023, our Diversion team rose to meet the increasing demand while remaining dedicated to offering comprehensive support.



# NURTURING WELLNESS

### Behavioral Health

In 2023, our Behavioral Health Department rose to the challenge of increasing demand for youth mental

health services. We expanded our team by adding five new staff members, including Behavioral Health Counselors and a Substance Abuse Counselor, to better

serve our community. Collaboration with Kaiser Permanente, Castle Hospital, and Queens Medical Center ensured smooth transitions for clients requiring care. Contracts with all five Medicaid plans underscored our commitment to reaching those

in need with essential services. Furthermore, our dedication to meeting youth where they are in their journey towards mental wellness was evident in the extension of operating

hours at our Kawailoa shelter. This initiative reflects our unwavering commitment to supporting the holistic well-being of our community's youth


